Producer **Russell Wyland** and Director **Eleanore Tapscott** are excited to present a masterpiece of American drama. The fourth play in August Wilson's Pittsburgh Cycle, *Fences* tells a story of love, anger, family hardship, and reconciliation set in Pittsburgh's Hill District during the 1950s. It is one of ten plays set in the Steel City that explore 100 years of the African-American experience.

FLOODLIGHT

Leading the cast are **Albert Bolden** and **Brenda Parker** as Troy and Rose Maxon. The cast is completed by **DeJeanette Horne** as Troy's best friend Bono, **Mack Leamon** as Troy's older son Lyons, **Jared Diallo** as Troy and Rose's son Cory, **Ayyaz Choudhury** as Troy's lovable but psychologically damaged brother Gabriel, and **Maya Bolden** as the optimistic child Raynell.

A first-rate production team is led by Assistant Director Marzanne Claiborne and Stage Managers Sherry Clarke and Brittany Huffman, assisted by Brook Easterly. Michael Donahue serves as fight director. Matt Liptak has designed another breath-taking set, drawing inspiration from August Wilson's beloved Hill District. Working closely with Matt are Tom O'Reilly as set builder, Luana Bossolo as set painter, and Russell Wyland as set decorator. Margaret Chapman, Joel Durgavich, and Bobbie Herbst are designing period props. Making sure the actors look their roles are Farrell Hartigan and Robin Worthington, co-costume designers, and Kadira Coley, make-up and hair designer; Robin will also serve as wardrobe mistress. Rounding out the crew is Alan Wray, sound designer.

An important COVID update for *Fences*. Everyone working on *Fences* – cast, members of the crew and production team, box office and front of house personnel – have been confirmed as vaccinated. Audience members, who must also be fully vaccinated, should plan to wear their masks for the entire performance. The show will run a total of 160 minutes, which includes a 15-minute break between Acts I and II.

During the same July meeting, the board elected **Chris Tomasino** to fill the position of Governor for Development, which was vacated when I was elected President. Now it looks as if we have another position to fill as Governor for Artistic Support **Susan Boyd** is leaving the area to enjoy retirement. The Board also approved the development of a Past Presidents Committee to serve as an advisor to the Board when needed. All past LTA presidents were invited to join, and all said yes. This gives us a committee of ten past presidents with a combined 40-year history to advise the Board on issues where long-term memory and experience are needed.

While we are off and running with the remainder of our 2021 - 2022 season, we are still mindful of the effect that the pandemic has had on us. Although we require our volunteers (on stage and off) and our staff and contractors to be vaccinated, we do encourage all volunteers to mask up when they are in the building if possible. The dreaded Delta variant and the unvaccinated have slowed the progress we were making earlier this year. During the bubonic plague Shakespeare wrote in and took his actors to perform in the countryside. Likewise, we have produced small plays for small audiences and held classes both on Zoom and outdoors. There is a light at the end of the tunnel, and together, we will get through this.

Finally, let me thank **Russ Wyland** for leading the theatre for the past four years, and especially the last. Russ not only helped to define our response to COVID-19 and to the restrictions put upon us, but he also worked on every show: producing two and both rigging and assisting with Front of House duties for all four. Thank you, Russ!

Also deserving mention are our trustees and our treasurer, who somehow managed to pay the bills while keeping our nest egg growing. Thank you to **Nick Burakow** and his fellow trustees and to **David Hale**!

#### **Front of House**

I am Monty Montgomery, the new Governor for Front of House. When I came to The Little Theatre several years ago to see the musical *Gypsy* and then again to see *Chicago*, I never imagined that I would eventually be responsible for a small part of its operations. Fast forward a few years: my wife told me that LTA needed people to help the caterer for the opening night party (ONP) of the musical West Side Story (see a pattern here?) so I volunteered. I wasn't yet a member, but this was something with which I could easily help. After assisting with several shows, I became the *de facto* lead volunteer for ONPs. Later I became the lead bartender and handled inventory management for intermission concessions and for ONP food, beverages, and supplies. Along the way, I have also ushered a few times.

Why do I tell you this tale? One does not have to know how to act, sing, paint, or swing a hammer to greet a patron when they arrive. One does not have to be an extrovert to prepare food and carry the trays for an ONP. One does not have to know how to serve an extensive list of mixed drinks to serve as a bartender. One does not even have to be a member to do any or all of these duties. A person of any age can serve, and no time commitment is too small. All one needs is a desire to serve and be part of something greater than oneself.

If you or any of your friends are looking for a place where a small amount of time will have a great impact, you need not look any further than Front of House. We are the first people that the audience sees when they enter the theatre, and we can help to set the tone for a great evening. # *Governor's Message* Membership

As the new Governor for Membership, I am excited to welcome all of our patrons, members, and volunteers back to the theatre in an almost post-pandemic world. At the same time, I am concerned that our membership numbers are very low and that retaining our current volunteers has been a challenge.

Five years ago, I volunteered to be a painter on a little show at LTA called *To Kill a Mockingbird*. Since then, through continuous volunteering, I have become a lead paint designer, chair of the paint department, producer, costume co-chair, lead safety officer, and now a member of the Board of Governors.

With our safe and cautious reopening, there are several new programs on the horizon to ensure that there are volunteer opportunities for anyone interested in learning to produce, to become a department chair or a member of the Board, or to embrace any other theater-related interest that you may have.

The first such program, which I am introducing here, is LTA's Mentoring Program. The goal of this initiative is to rigorously cultivate a cadre of volunteers who will be prepared to move into our leadership positions, from lead designers to governors.

So how will this work? You let me know what interests you – let's say dressing sets, designing props, or producing – and I will match you with a seasoned set dresser, props designer, or producer with whom you may apprentice. (For instance, I happen to know that the current Governor for Building is looking to mentor someone who is interested in learning the ropes of that position.) Obviously, this can't be achieved without our experienced volunteers. You are integral to making this ambitious program into the great success that I know it can be. We must show our newer volunteers that we value their passion for LTA.

Eventually these partnerships will develop into a robust succession plan so that when positions need to be filled, there will be knowledgeable volunteers ready to take the lead. These two new programs are vital to all volunteers feeling welcomed and having opportunities and to the very future of our wonderful community theatre. New eyes = fresh ideas!

# Upcoming Auditions

Adapted from the 1843 book by Charles Dickens, *A Christmas Carol* follows a miserly, embittered man who embarks on a journey of self-discovery and reclamation through the aid of several spirits who remind him of the true meaning of Christmas.

#### **Audition Notes**

Auditions will consist of sides from the script and one Christmas carol or short classical holiday song of your choice. An accompanist will be provided.

#### EVERY ACTOR MUST BE FULLY VACCINATED AGAINST COVID -19 AND BRING PROOF (vaccination card, copy, or digital photo) TO THE AUDITION.

While you are waiting to audition, you will be asked to wear a face mask covering both your nose and your mouth. You will be permitted to remove your face mask during the audition.

If you have a headshot and acting resumé, you may bring them with you; if not, you may be asked to have your picture taken by the audition coordinator. Please bring an accurate list of rehearsal conflicts with you to the audition.

LTA will conduct basic background checks on all cast members due to the presence of underage actors.

#### **Character Descriptions**

We will consider any gender and person of color for any role. Not every role is listed. British dialects will be used in this production. Young actor roles are double cast and rehearsals and performances will be divided evenly.

**Ebenezer Scrooge**: A brittle man who has retreated from the world behind a wall made of money. Unable to connect with those around him, he is given an opportunity for redemption through several spirits that visit him.

**Ghost of Marley**: Scrooge's deceased business partner who hopes to dissuade Scrooge from his current path

**Ghost of Christmas Past**: The embodiment of love and loss. Ethereal and serene, they aid with processing painful but important memories.

**Ghost of Christmas Present**: The embodiment of family and charity. Has a large, joyful presence but knows how to drive a point home.

Bob Cratchit: Scrooge's long-suffering clerk and father of Tiny Tim.

Mrs. Cratchit: An outspoken woman who loves her family fiercely.

Fred: Scrooge's nephew who is determined to never give up on his uncle.

Young Scrooge: Ebeneezer Scrooge as a young adult.

Belle: Young Scrooge's fianceé.

Dick: Young Scrooge's coworker and friend.

Mrs. Pipchin: Scrooge's housekeeper; Cockney accent preferred.

**Tiny Tim**: The disabled child of Bob and Mrs. Cratchit whose cheerful nature uplifts everyone around him.

Council Corner About 20 years ago, I became a member of the LTA Council, and it has always been a rewarding experience for me. But why? What have I gotten out of it, what have I contributed, and now where is it going to go? Have things changed, and if so, what has changed?
