President's Column

The Whole is Greater than the Sum of Its Parts

As I write this, a Thursday night audience has settled in for a performance of *The Audience*. The action on stage might have just started, but action behind the scenes began several hours earlier.

I arrived at LTA at 6:15 p.m. to find Donna, the wardrobe mistress, finishing the day's laundry and ironing costumes. The actors are going to look great for tonight's performance. Ken, the set builder, is also here; he is checking the set to make certain that everything operates as it should. Much to my surprise and delight, I find Sue hidden away in the dressing room, comb in hand, giving a quick refresh to the wig styles that she designed. Right on time, the other crew members begin to arrive: one stage manager (Christine), two assistant stage managers (Eli and Joel), sound and lights (Gene and Donna, respectively), and props and wardrobe (Sherry and Margaret, likewise).

As I walk out to the lobby, I see Ira, tonight's house manager, talking with Caterina and Michelle, tonight's box office personnel. Soon, I see Leslie and Ann as they fill pitchers and test scanners. They are tonight's ushers and, too often, the only LTA workers to interact with our audience members.

While most audience members see eight actors on the stage plus a few volunteers working at the front of the house, I see eight actors and twice that many other people making tonight's performance happen. It's a beautiful sight, and no single person – actor or techie or designer or other volunteer – could make this happen on his/her own. And when the audience applauds at the end of this evening's performance, it will be clear that what happens onstage is greater than the sum of all the people who worked on the show. That's stage magic.

I think it is important to be reminded of the magic and what it takes to make it happen. If you already volunteer at LTA, thank you for being part of the magic. If you don't currently volunteer, I invite you to become part of the magic -a part of a whole that is greater than the sum of its parts.

Upcoming Auditions

Come be part of the D.C. premiere of this riveting play! Here is your opportunity to perform vaudeville and burlesque! Playwright Douglas Carter Beane has created a fictional examination of what life was like for a semicloseted gay actor in 1930s New York. Using the backdrop of vaudeville and burlesque and the volatile politics of the day, Bean uses comic sketches, striptease, and riveting drama to remind us that personal and artistic freedom wasn't easily won and that repression is always lurking.

For the Audition

Actors will read from the script.

Character Descriptions

Chauncey Miles: (Male, 45 - 55) The Nance, an actor who plays high-camp gay men in vaudeville/burlesque comedy routines. (The nance is to vaudeville and the "pansy craze" what blackface was to minstrel shows.) With his self-loathing and self-destructive politics, Chaunce is a comic genius onstage but a troubled soul offstage. While his timing is spot-on and his wordplay easy, Chaunce just can't seem to get out of his own way. This role requires an experienced actor who can sing.

Ned: (Male, 25 - 30) Attractive and not terribly sophisticated, Ned is a country boy in the city. He is earnest and has a great work ethic, and is emotionally open and vulnerable. Despite his physical strength, he often appears dense but is very smart. As a performer in sketches, he must have natural flair for burlesque comedy as both comic and straight man. Note: Nudity is required.

Efram: (Male, 50 - 60) Jewish, a performer and a business man who runs the "artistic side" of the Irving Place Theater. Efram is a natural worrier and fretter and has a Damon Runyon quality to his speech. Onstage, he must be able to handle "top banana" style burlesque comedy. He has a tough exterior but a good heart.

Sylvie: (Female 35 - 59) A burlesque stripper, Sylvie is a Catholic Communist from the outer boroughs of New York who has not had an easy life. She possesses a real no-nonsense vocal quality with a New York accent. The actress playing Sylvie must be comfortable with movement and with wearing very little clothing for the striptease sequences. Sylvie is a strong presence who can hold her own in an argument. Some singing required.

Carmen: (Female, 20 - 46) A burlesque stripper, born in New Jersey but of Latin descent, she can put on and take off the Latina accent as the situation (in life or in a sketch) permits. She has a big heart but has not had an easy life. The actress playing Carmen must be comfortable with movement and with wearing very little clothing for striptease sequences. Some singing involved.

Joanie: (Female, 20 - 39) A burlesque stripper, she has a wonderful Gracie Allen/Jean Arthur quality that makes her a natural for sketches. She is borderline blasé and sort of takes things as they come. The actress who plays Joanie must be comfortable with movement and with wearing very little clothing for striptease sequences. Some singing involved.

Solving Long-Standing Problems

Anyone involved with an established volunteer organization will attest that sometimes things are done simply because ... that's the way things are done. Occasionally, even problems become institutionalized instead of being solved. One such problem at LTA has been the timing according to which our season is chosen. By custom, the Board has always waited until July to form a play selection committee. This gives the new

board members and president – both of whom have terms beginning July 1st – the opportunity to choose members of the committee. The timing, however, puts the Board in a bind. To come to a well-considered decision, the committee can't have a season ready for the Board until November or December. This arrangement means that directors can't be selected until January or February, and producers must then be chosen in haste in March. This is how it has been for years, and Board members have always complained about how this arrangement puts LTA at a disadvantage for finding directors and producers.

This year, however, the Board decided to stop complaining about the problem and, instead, to solve it. **Ashley Amidon**, Governor for Seasonal Planning, formed a play selection committee in February, with a plan to have a slate of shows ready for the Board this summer. This action pulled the process several months ahead of schedule and gives the Board new options moving forward. Stay tuned for where this new procedure takes us.

Even as Governor Amidon and her selection committee are thinking about plays for LTA's 2019 - 2020 season, Governor for Production **Margaret Evans-Joyce** is recruiting producers and production staff members for 2018 - 2019. If you are interested in learning how to produce or working in some other capacity during the coming season, please let MEJ know.

Other Board members are also looking to the future. Governor for Building **David Hale** is finalizing the timing for the installation of the fire protection system. It is a complicated project, and the goal is to not disrupt audiences or students. Governor for Membership **Maria Ciarrocchi** has begun planning the next annual meeting, which is only three short months away, and Governor for Development **Jim Howard** has started to plan for the annual sponsor lottery, promoting our new season to a group of organizations eager to partner with LTA.

Governor for Education **Mike Baker** is working with camp director **Michael Page** to finalize this year's exciting slate of summer camps. If you know parents who want to enroll their child in a rich theatrical experience, tell them about our summer camps, which are among the best in Maryland, D.C., and northern Virginia.

Finally, Governor for Box Office **Bobbie Herbst** is leading a dedicated and talented team, including **Lloyd Bittinger** and **Ira Forstater**, to cover the vacancy left while **Crissy Wilke**, LTA's Box Office Manager, is out on maternity leave. Many thanks to Bobbie, Lloyd, and Ira for ensuring that LTA's vital functions continue even as we eagerly await the newest member of the theatre family.

The Council approved spending an additional \$2,000 on our Shakespeare Garden. On the brick wall they plan to put three trellises, with New Dawn Roses climbing up the trellises.
