Though it is only a flesh wound, this scandalous incident needs to be kept quiet. To make matters worse, the hostess and servants are missing, dinner preparations are abandoned in the kitchen, and more guests are expected at any minute. They must get their story straight before the other guests arrive and also somehow pull off this dinner party. As the confusions and miscommunications mount, the evening spins into classic farcical hilarity wrapped in *Dynasty*-era formal wear and big hair. An evening of secrets, lies, accusations, cover-ups, hypotheses, and yes, rumors, ensues until the police arrive to try to sort things out.

A Heartfelt Thanks

I put a lot of work into being LTA President, but I got so much more from the experience, and I thank everyone for being so supportive, especially since the start of the pandemic.

If I did any good as president, it was because I had four great Boards to work with over the past four years. I want to thank, in particular, **Maria Ciarrocchi**, **Ashley Amidon**, **Rachel Alberts**, and **Frank Shutts**, each of whom served as my president pro-tem at one time or another; **Lynn O'Connell** and **Jamie Blake**, respectively our incomparable board secretary and executive secretary; **David Hale**, our long-serving treasurer; **Nick Burakow** and the members of the LTA financial trustees; **Lloyd Bittinger**, **Zell Murphy**, and all the members of the LTA Council; **Ken Brown** and **Stacey Becker**, LTA's first safety officers; and, of course, **Crissy Wilke** and **Tina McCrea**, our two extraordinary employees. There are so many more, and I will be spending the next month or two making sure that I thank all of those people who deserve a "shout out."

This litany of thank-yous might make it seem as if I am picking up and leaving LTA forever, but the truth is that I will still be around doing rigging, producing, and taking on odd tasks as needed. While I look forward to being away from the Board – at least for now – I am eager to do whatever I can to support **Frank Shutts** and the new Board.

And then there is COVID. I have tried to think of something insightful to say about the pandemic and its impact on LTA. I never could have imagined that a virus could dominate my last two years in office. Looking back, there is not a lot that I would change about how the Board responded to a terrible situation. We did the best we could do given the lousy hand we were dealt. I am very proud that LTA kept in-person theater alive – even if only on life support – through Small Theater for Unusual Times. I am proud that we were able to articulate our vision, principles, and procedures before most other organizations had done so, and I am even prouder that when those organizations were finally ready to re-open, many came to us for advice.

There is, of course, a long way left to go in our pandemic rebuilding. At some point, for example, LTA will need to adjust its mask mandate for vaccinated people. That time has not yet arrived, but one can see public expectations as well as national, state, and city regulations moving in that direction. My hope for the new Board is that they will continue to 1) put safety first, and 2) never feel afraid to adjust when the time comes.

Finally, I want to end my report with a statement on diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI). In the middle of the pandemic, our country experienced the trauma of George Floyd's murder. If I have one wish for the theatre, it is to stay committed to creating a diverse theater family, to provide opportunities to anyone who wants them, and to treat everyone in a way that celebrates both their uniqueness as well as what we all share. LTA's DEI committee is making LTA a better place, and I hope everyone commits to becoming even more welcoming to anyone who crosses our threshold.

Annual Meeting Highlights

On June 14th, for the second year in a row, LTA's annual meeting was held virtually, with members "attending" either via Zoom or by phoning in.

Once again, the major topic of discussion was the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic on LTA's finances and programming. President **Russell Wyland** reported that as expected, the theatre's finances took a significant hit due to reduced audience sizes and in-person class offerings. However, Board members also adjusted their respective budgets accordingly and kept operating costs down as much as possible. Combined with LTA's significant rainy day fund, these measures ensured that the theatre remains on solid financial ground as we return to presenting a full-scale mainstage season, albeit with one less production, and a more complete slate of classes.

Six individuals were elected via mailin ballot to serve on the Board of Governors, including Frank Shutts, President; Ira Forstater, Box Office; Monty Montgomery, Front of House; Stacey Becker, Membership; Eleanore Tapscott, Seasonal Planning; and Ken Crowley, Technical Support.

Lastly, I would like to thank some people who worked extremely hard to ensure that shows were produced and able to be staged for the past year in order to maintain LTA's community presence. First, thank you to **Russ Wyland** and **Lynn O'Connell** for producing most of the shows and for helping to maintain quality on a smaller scale so that audiences could enjoy live theater when they felt comfortable returning for that adventure. Thanks also to everyone involved in *A Christmas Carol* – especially **Mike Baker**, **Ira Forstater**, and **Charlotte Corneliusen** – for their many hours of working out the details to produce a full-scale show that still maintained the safety of the performers, and for the huge effort involved in producing a show for streaming. The thank-yous would not be complete without recognizing our safety officers, **Ken Brown** and **Stacey Becker**, for their tireless work with the City of Alexandria and the theatre to ensure a safe environment and their diligence in planning how to implement those requirements so that we could keep our doors open.

This classic late '60s thriller follows the heroine, Susy Hendrix, through a suspenseful game of cat and mouse. Susy, who recently became blind, unwittingly possesses a doll filled with illicit drugs, which is being sought by a sinister group of con men who have traced it to the Greenwich Village apartment Susy shares with her husband. When Susy discovers the true nature of her situation, she and the young girl upstairs launch a daring counterplot against the thieves.

Audition Notes

Auditions will consist of cold readings from the script.

While you are waiting to audition, you will be asked to wear a face mask. You will be permitted to remove your face mask during the audition.

If you have a headshot and acting résumé, you may bring them with you; if not, you may be asked to have your picture taken by the audition coordinator.

Please bring an accurate list of rehearsal conflicts with you to the audition.

Character Descriptions

Susy Hendrix (female, 20s - 30s): The heroine. She lost her vision a year ago in a car accident and is still adapting. Married to Sam. She is resourceful and intelligent. Possessing a very strong will, she is highly intuitive even when the stakes are high and her own life is on the line.

Sam Hendrix (male, 20s - 30s): Susy's husband, a photographer and former Marine. Sam is supportive of Susy, but he also challenges her to become as independent as possible. They have been married for six months.

Mike Talman (male, 20s - 40s): A con man with a smooth demeanor of sincerity and self-assurance. He has recently been released from prison. Talman's job is to get close to Susy Hendrix; gradually he becomes sympathetic to her.

Harry Roat, Jr. (male, 40s - 50s) A sinister and cool-headed villain, Roat is the mastermind of the doll scheme. Roat is intelligent, calculating, and sadistic. He has a great deal of presence and projects a subtle threat.

Sgt. Carlino (male, 20s - 40s): Talman's partner, another con man who has just been released from prison. Carlino is a bit coarse and uneducated, with a flexible code of ethics. His pride is often challenged, which frequently leads to a souring of his attitude.

Gloria (female, 12 - 14): The Hendrixes' upstairs neighbor. She helps Susy with chores and various tasks. Coming from a troubled home life, Gloria adores Sam but is initially petulant when dealing with Susy. Over the course of the play, their relationship evolves, and she and Susy team up to defeat the con men. (The script refers to Gloria as nine years old, but we have permission to increase the age reference up to 12 years old, to accommodate casting a vaccinated actor.)

Policemen (male, any age): Two policemen arrive at the very end and discover the chaotic scene.
