# President's Column



# Lloyd Bittinger

Last year during the season selection process, the Board of Governors decided to survey members and subscribers asking for recommendations for musicals and plays. We called this LTA's "Audience Choice Season" since most of the shows were from the survey. The Board of Governors, however, utilizes several different methods for season selection. This year, we decided to put the 2017 - 2018 season together based on shows that we had attempted to do during the past few years but were unable to for various reasons, often because we could not obtain the rights to stage the shows at the time. Our logic was that these shows were previously considered and selected, and therefore had been sufficiently vetted. Thus, if they were now available, they should result in another excellent season for The Little Theatre. In this regard, the board selected the following shows for the 2017 - 2018 season:

Our thought processes in this selection were that we wanted to offer shows that we knew our audience would like, and we also wanted to do some new shows, be a little adventuresome, and even add a bit of an edge to help make it an exciting and interesting season.

After we announced our season last year, many people responded by saying they thought it was a very good season, and we are doing very well so far with good reviews and attendance. But at the same time, some people said they were not too excited about the season and they thought it was somewhat mediocre. This year after we announced the season (it is on the LTA website), which we thought had all the elements to make a good season, I again heard the same responses: most people thought it was a very good season, but some others have expressed an opinion that it is not so good. The lesson learned again and again seems to be that as hard as we try, we cannot please everyone, but we surely do try to please most of our members and subscribers. Although this may not be shocking news, as it is almost always the case in many facets of life, including our current national political situation, there has been a lot of thought, consideration, time, and effort invested into putting together a season that will be good for our theatre, yet some will like it and some will not.

We do indeed value the opinions of members and subscribers, and we ask that you continue to share your feelings with us and to make recommendations for shows that you would like to see us produce. There are thousands and thousands of musicals and plays out there, and from these thousands we are limited to selecting eight shows a year. So we cannot completely please everyone, but we still keep the best interests of the theatre in mind when putting the season together. I ask all of you to let us know what you think, to give us ideas that we may eventually be able to use in the selection process, and to stand with us and behind us as we attempt to continue the tremendous success that is The Little Theatre of Alexandria.

• In order to maintain tax-exempt status with the Commonwealth of Virginia, the board was required to have an external financial review conducted and submitted. Treasurer **David Hale** coordinated the review with an independent accounting firm. The review is complete, and he distributed the report to board members. All financial transactions and methodologies are in good order with only

transactions and methodologies are in good order, with only a few minor recommendations having been made.

- The LTA Council is conducting a fundraising campaign by selling bricks for the patio area to members. The bricks will have special inscriptions on them and will be part of the Shakespeare Garden that is in the process of being developed. LTA Council Director **Carolyn Winters** updated the board on the progress of the fundraising and garden plans.
- The Director for Seasonal Planning, **Frank Shutts**, reviewed plans for the theatre's participation in First Night Alexandria, which occurs on New Year's Eve.
- Jean Coyle, Chairman of the ADA Committee, reviewed an analysis regarding the possible replacement of the public water fountain located in the hallway near the coat room. It was decided not to alter the existing configuration due to physical limitations. There is a water cooler located in the business office, and we also make bottled water available to the public before most shows and at intermission.
- The Governor for Membership, **Maria Ciarrocchi**, who coordinates the activities of the Millennial Committee, reviewed plans for an event during the production of *Anything Goes*.
- The Governor for Building, **David Hale**, reviewed the progress in working with the other owners of our off-site storage garages. With the coordinated efforts of all the owners, we are looking into ways to make the property more attractive. David also reviewed quotes that we had received to remove some dead trees located in the patio area, and the board approved expenditure to remove the trees.
- Jim Howard, Governor for Development, reviewed the recent participation of The Little Theatre in the Scottish Christmas Walk/LTA Open House, as well as the City of Alexandria Tree Lighting Ceremony. He informed the board that we would also participate in the George Washington Birthday Parade scheduled for February 20th.
- The Governor for Education, **Mike Baker**, distributed an updated schedule for the 2017 LTA Summer Camp and requested board approval. The schedule was approved as presented.
- Two of the three AEDs (automated external defibrillators) were recently recalled for an upgrade. Jean Coyle, Governor for Front of House, informed the board of the recall and of the location of the one remaining AED in the event of an emergency.
- Margaret Evans-Joyce, Governor for Production, informed the board that a free CPR course had recently been provided to several members of the theatre. She said that these courses will be provided periodically on an ongoing basis.
- The upcoming 2017 2018 season was announced by the Governor for Seasonal Planning, Frank Shutts. The season is addressed elsewhere in this publication. We have initiated advertising for directors for the upcoming season. Ken and Patti Crowley were appointed as co-chairs of the Director Selection Committee.

These are just some of the things that the Board of Governors continues to work on as we move through the year. Please feel free to discuss any of these projects or ask questions of any member of the board.

# *Governor's Message* Education

"In order to maintain its ideal form, theater needs to be subsidized," says Robert Brustein, senior research fellow and founding director of the American Repertory Theater (ART). "If a nonprofit theater has enough resources independent of box-office receipts, it can defy its critics, or even stay *ahead* of its critics," he declares.

The Little Theatre of Alexandria has been on the cutting edge of community theater education for over a decade now. What began as a handful of classes some 17 years ago has burgeoned into over 50 classes for children and adults, largely under the tutelage of the late Governor for Education, **Roland Branford Gomez**. One of Roland's greatest achievements here at LTA is the growth of the education program to include a flourishing summer camp program. "The LTA education program has been a great success here at LTA. It has been successful in its own right, but also on a financial basis. We are very proud of the educational program and for what Roland did for LTA," commented LTA President **Lloyd Bittinger**.

Roland knew that theater is where creativity and learning join forces. A top real estate salesperson, he never lost sight of LTA's bottom line. More classes and superlative teachers meant more income. Roland knew that the educational concerns and artistic inventiveness that stem from the freeform world of theater would help to endow LTA for years to come.

Roland set out to find teachers who could meld thoughts, feelings, sensations, and experiences into an active and productive theater enterprise. He even recruited this writer. My Acting I and Acting II classes have produced a dozen showcases and at least seven original plays. Six of my students have gone on to successful film and television careers. Over 20 student trips to New York for professional master classes have also reaped untold benefits.

Not surprisingly, other LTA instructors have had similar experiences under Roland's tutelage. **Rich Amada**, awardwinning playwright and LTA instructor, has written more than 30 plays and seen his work produced across the country. According to Rich, "It's my turn to pass on that knowledge and assist those who aspire to write dramatic works and enrich our world with their voices."

**Kathy Dillaber**, one of LTA's longest-tenured instructors, is loved by parents and children alike. According to Kathy, "My students discover that communication, shared space, and problem solving are keys to success as they work together, learning about all the aspects of theater."

John Waldron continues to introduce the art of improvisation to young students and echoes many in the creative world: "Improvisation classes for young actors pay real dividends in personality development and academic achievement." Moreover, the adult improvisation classes that **Keely Kirk** and **Sarah Holt** teach are equally important in a successful actor's development. Keely is a master improv artist who is known for her deft touch with beginners. Sarah started LTA's improv program in 2001 and also performs with LTA's in-house improv troupe, the Retrocessionists.

**Michael Page**, another of Roland's finds, teaches "Tap for Actors" and "Tap for Beginners." Michael is also the LTA Summer Camp Director. He has taught dance, musical theater, and other aspects of the performing arts for over 12 years.

**Roberta Masters-Cullen**, one of LTA's most revered instructors, teaches both during the week and on weekends. "I love seeing the joy on children's faces when they're acting out stories, moving like various animals or different characters, and they discover the magic of pretending ... creating an imaginary world far away from electronics and screens. All children are creative, if only we give them a time and space to explore their ideas," says Roberta.

**Heather Sanderson**, a creative mainstay of our program, seeks to foster and nurture children's emotional intelligence through play, teamwork, and freedom of expression. Heather also prides herself on helping the shyest of children find their voices. This spring, she will be teaching a half-dozen children's classes, all filled to the brim.

Linda Wells' contributions to LTA both as teacher/performer and music director of *A Christmas Carol* are exemplary. Her class for children, "Singing for Musical Theatre," is one of the theatre's most popular. Linda began her singing/ musical theatre career at a well-known local dinner theatre and went on to perform professionally in musicals at a number (continued on page 8) (continued from page 7)

of theatres in the eastern United States. She is one of the area's finest vocal teachers/coaches for young adults. According to Linda, "Some children take my class on a regular basis, and it is so nice to see how they grow and blossom, not just in their singing and performance abilities, but in other areas of their lives." Linda also edits the Floodlight newsletter for LTA.

Ashley Hammond is yet another of Mr. Gomez's success stories. Ashley's loving and creative touch has been inspiring to watch. Her "Under the Sea" class has drawn raves. She is the daughter of renowned NBC Sports anchor Tom Hammond.

WATCH Award-winning choreographer Amy Carson also teaches at LTA. A protégé of nearly all the top area directors, including the late Mr. Gomez, Amy was a natural addition to LTA's core curriculum. You can see any number of Amy's "Broadway Boogie" dancers in area shows.

Joanna Henry was honored yet again by the Washington-area awards community for her direction of LTA's The Complete Works of William Shakespeare (Abridged). DCMetroTheatreArts also selected it as one of the best shows of 2016. Joanna is an esteemed theater and English teacher at Bishop Ireton and teaches Acting II here at LTA.

Beverley Benda, LTA's longest-tenured instructor, was a singer with the Army Band, "Pershing's Own," for 29 years, and is a free-lance performer. Bev has sung at The White House, the Kennedy Center, Carnegie Hall, Rockefeller Center, and Disney World. She also has the longest-running class at LTA (1986 to present). She will offer a pair of voice classes this spring: "Voice for Beginners" and "Performance Class for Intermediate and Advanced Singers."

Finally, no discussion of LTA's Education Program would be complete without highlighting the unselfish endeavors of business manager Virginia Lacey and the unflagging support of the LTA President and Board. Thank you!

In all, LTA will offer over 70 adult and children's classes this spring and summer. Our classes boost self-confidence and foster one's creative ideas and abilities. They promote compassion and tolerance and help develop one's mind, body, and voice. In short, LTA classes offer a right-brained perception of the world that is non-linear, intuitive, and holistic. Albert Einstein may have summed it up best: "Imagination is more important than knowledge." I hope that all of you concur.

If you haven't heard, the Council's project this year is to turn our courtyard into a Shakespeare Garden. In December, phase one was completed. Twenty-six personalized bricks were placed in the courtyard along with an image of Shakespeare and the LTA logo. This was done to help us learn the ins and outs of ordering and installing the bricks. **Tina Anderson** and **Sharon Field** have been working hard on the ordering system, and Tina also came up with the Shakespeare image and the LTA logo. So when you're at LTA, go out into the courtyard and see how nice it looks. All of the living LTA presidents have already supported this project, and their personalized bricks are in the courtyard.
