Auerbach and Kimberly Pitcher-Crago will set the mood as lighting designer and master electrician, and Lynn Lacey will add haunting noises and holiday cheer as the sound designer. Other "spirits" working to make this a great production include Clare Baker as dance captain, Becky Patton as double-tech dinner hostess, Margie Remmers as opening night party hostess, and Doug Olmsted as photographer.

President's Column

On a recent Sunday evening in October, The Little Theatre of Alexandria held our annual Awards Night ceremony where awards were presented in 24 categories for acting, directing, technical achievement, and outstanding members. It was a fun evening remembering all the great productions of the 2015–2016 season. Congratulations to all the winners in these various categories. Now I want to use this opportunity to shine a light on a group of individuals who make tremendous contributions to the success of each of our productions, but who are not eligible for an award.

For dedicated theater people, it's easy to answer the question, "What is the difference between a director and a producer?" But many people ask me this question. For all the shows we do every season at The Little Theatre, we have to have a producer–usually more than one for each show. During the last 12 months, the following people have stepped up to the plate and volunteered to be a producer: **Rachel Alberts, Brooke Angel, Jay Cohen, Bobbie Herbst, Jim Howard, Robert Kraus, John Monnett, Lynn O'Connell, Kevin O'Dowd, Eddie Page, Rebecca Sheehy, Mary Beth Smith-Toomey, Alan Wray, and Russell Wyland**. We all pretty much know that the director directs the actors and action of the show. Here are just some of the many things that the producer is responsible for:

- ♦ assembling the production staff, including all the designers (sound, lights, costumes, props, etc.)
- o writing audition notices, show articles, and a follow-up thank you article
- \diamond arranging for the auditions
- o coordinating the read-throughs and rehearsals
- dealing with the various issues related to the actors (i.e., conflict schedules, rehearsal schedules, etc.)
- ensuring that the double-tech dinner and opening night party are arranged
- o disciplining and/or replacing actors and/or production staff as needed
- setting up the cue-to-cue rehearsals and tech week rehearsals
- organizing the dressing rooms to accommodate all the actors
- ◊ coordinating the dress rehearsals and all the performances during the run
- paying most of the bills related to the show budget (along with the theatre's treasurer)
- being on-duty at the theatre for every performance
- o coordinating thank you gifts for everyone involved in the production
- o wrapping up all loose ends related to the production

The producer is the number one person who is responsible for everything related to the show from start to finish. He/she usually starts putting things together several months before the show opens, and then continues to finalize things after the show is over and the set has been struck. It seems that the producer is somewhat taken for granted and asked to work day and night (and weekends too!), and there is never an award for a producer. This acknowledgment serves as a great big "thank you" to all the producers over the years who have done a tremendously good job and to whom no award was ever given. Thank you to our producers!

The Board of Governors continues to meet on the third Wednesday of each month. Below are some of the issues that have been on the agenda for recent meetings.

- Michael Page, Camp Director, made a presentation to the board following completion of the summer camp. The camp had a 72% increase in attendance from the previous year.
- Rae Edmonson and Mary Beth Smith-Toomey were
 approved as the co-producers for our upcoming production of *Legally Blonde*.
- **Robert Kraus** presented the producers' report for *To Kill a Mockingbird* for himself and co-producers **Rachel Alberts** and **Bobbie Herbst**.
- Updated job descriptions were approved by the board for the business manager and box office manager positions.
- The organization chart for the theatre was updated.
- Plans for a Celebration of Life in memory of **Roland Branford Gomez**, who was a board member at the time of his passing, were reviewed, and co-producers were assigned.
- A letter of concern was read that had been submitted by a person previously associated with our production of *Steel Magnolias*.
- The Director of the LTA Council, **Carolyn Winters**, discussed plans for the Council to plant a Shakespearian garden and perform other improvements on the patio area of the theatre.
- Michael Baker was welcomed to the board as the Governor for Education, replacing recently deceased Roland Branford Gomez. He discussed recent activities related to education as well as plans for the *DC Connection* seminar.
- Upcoming CPR classes are being planned as reported by Margaret Evans-Joyce, Governor for Production.
- The process for the board to select plays and musicals for the 2017–2018 theatre season was reviewed by **Frank Shutts**, Governor for Seasonal Planning.
- **Robert Kraus**, Governor for Technical Support, reported that a new and improved camera monitoring system has been installed at the stage manager's desk and that it is a significant improvement over the old system.
- The Governor for Artistic Support, **Beverley Benda**, reported that **Charles Dragonette** and **Judy Kee** would serve as the off-site garage chairs for the remainder of this year. She is still trying to locate chairs for the costume department.
- **David Hale**, Governor for Building, reported that the Building Committee is working with some of the off-site storage garage owners regarding making physical improvements of the garages.

Governor's Message Public Relations

I recently attended a workshop dedicated to community arts marketing. The sessions were interesting, the attendees engaged, and the content was surprising. During the last decade, the way we market, promote, engage and even experience art has changed drastically. When I started as the Governor for Public Relations for LTA several years ago, the marketing focus was mostly on print ads. We worked hard to develop a solid press list, we courted and counted on our reviewers to come to our shows and write (hopefully) positively about what they saw, and we hired skilled photographers to capture our performances to help visually publicize each show. But now, that strategy has gone out the proverbial window.

How people get their information has changed so radically and so quickly, and LTA, like many other arts organizations, has had to sprint to keep up. We (and by "we" I mean mostly Tina and a few hardworking members of the marketing committee) must get our information out to patrons via Facebook, Twitter, and the LTA website. We still advertise on paper, but that is quickly being replaced by Yelp ads, Instagram, electronic personal reviews, and the constant lightning speed of "sharing." We now rely more on electronic word of mouth ("If you liked the show, tell your friends!") than patrons perusing the newspaper to decide what performance at which theater to attend. Clearly, the importance of an internet presence cannot be underestimated. Even this very publication you are reading right now – LTA's *Floodlight* newsletter – has had to change to keep up. How many of you still receive this valuable publication in paper form? Not many anymore. And the number decreases every year.

So next time you're home leisurely flipping through your local newspaper, or a publication you picked up at your neighborhood coffee shop, think about how you find your information. How do you know what's coming up? What entices you to buy a ticket or to see a show? Did you hear about it from your friends? Virtual or actual?

And please, let us know. We here at LTA are more than willing to keep up the sprint to keep you informed on all the wonderful goings-on at LTA.
